

In Memory of Our Dear Friend and Co-Founder



We all inherit scripts and stories from our families.

Dr. Robert Milch’s inheritance included the struggles of immigrants and the shadows of anti-Semitism, but these adversities were outmatched by his family and his people’s search for knowledge and beauty. With that legacy, he learned to live with purpose and lead with kindness, in devotion to family and with concern for others. Bob would go on to influence, move and motivate others with one flick of a word or turn of a phrase.

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
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Buffalo General nurse with Dr. Robert Milch, at the opening of the first dedicated palliative care unit.

He loved art, language, medicine and justice — but only insofar as he could find humanity in them.

He needed poetry, prose and language that was lyrical, and that captured the richness of minds and hearts. Of the care of patients, he wrote, “If you would meet the patient’s needs, you must go beyond the mere proficiencies of your training, listen to what you are hearing, see the world with their vision, and understand their fears, for their fears are the manifestations of their needs.”

Of course, having been raised well, Bob would have thought it imprudent to list his many achievements and accolades. And that is unfortunate, because Bob was an uncommon man who was either blessed or cursed with being better than most at just about everything, and adoration followed him throughout life.

Perhaps more important than the achievements or summits Bob reached were the paths he chose throughout his life. He always searched for the largest burden to bear, and he carried it each time — not for himself, but for others. Many years ago, someone asked me to describe what motivated Bob and I replied, “Well, he just sleeps better at night if he slays some dragons during the day.”

Where Bob found humanity lacking, he sought change with purpose and purity.

Why else would a talented young surgeon, at the height of his skill and prominence, leave

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the prestige of the operating room to care for hospice patients in their homes, patients beyond intervention or cure, patients in need of a simple presence? I always assumed that he had no choice — he was compelled by the potential for something more humane and he held a vision that few could see. So, he put down the scalpel, and with the same proficiency and determination as when he was holding it, he picked up the sword of advocacy. Bob went from being gowned and gloved to stealing supplies from the same hospital he worked at to take to patients’ homes.

In 1977, the dragon he set out to fight was in the form of a CEO at Buffalo General Hospital, and the injustice he rose against was patient suffering. That year there were exactly zero hospital-based Palliative Care Units in the United States. So, Bob approached the CEO about a dedicated Palliative Care Unit and the CEO expressed concern about revenue-generating bed loss. Like all heroes, Bob was inspired rather than deterred by being told “no.” So he signed a blank check and told the CEO to fill it in at the end of the year to cover the loss. That moment of defiance helped launch the momentum towards hospital-based palliative care, and today over 70 percent of U.S. hospitals offer palliative care programs. He also helped launch the first freestanding Hospice Inpatient Unit, situated on our campus in Cheektowaga.

In fact, Hospice Buffalo was the 11th established hospice in the nation. Today there are over 5,500 such organizations, which collectively served over 1.6 million patients last year.

In 1999, I sat across from Bob for a job interview, during which I observed the same level of undeterred advocacy. This interview would change my life. I asked Bob what qualities he was looking for in a doctor entering his field, and without missing a beat, he answered, “righteous indignation.” Bob’s advocacy for more humane care never stopped — same fight just different dragons...from advocating for universal healthcare to the Medical Aid in Dying Act. His writings are a plea to better align the workings of healthcare to the true needs of the patient, to get

closer to the patient's bedside and to understand the view from the bed. In a recent article, he began with a Spanish proverb: "As one moves from the stands to the arena, the perspective on the bull changes." He then wrote, "I cannot in good conscience dictate to someone else when they reach an intolerable point of suffering, when the ravages of irreversible disease demand only its endurance, often inconsistent with the values and philosophy with which one has lived." You can see why it is that he was built for such heavy work — with his fierce intellect, surpassed by an even bigger heart and of course his beautiful language. What was so defining about this article was how he ended it...with four simple words, "Bring on the bull."

One of Bob's greatest gifts was knowing when: when to listen, when to guide, when to express concern, when to laugh and when to hug.

My lifelong passion has been horses. Bob would often sit quietly as I went on and on about all things having to do with horses. One day I commented to him that I didn't realize how much he also loved talking about horses. He smiled and said, "I don't. I love you when you talk about horses." Many of the people he loved, he did so because of, rather despite, their frailties and shortcomings — he embraced those who walked the lines between madness and genius, those with struggles of addiction or depression, those who are often marginalized or misunderstood. Again, his belief was that our most redeeming quality is our shared struggle to remain humane.

One of my favorite memories of Bob is that whenever we had a new medical student or resident, he would block off several hours to sit with them — this was his sacred time, when he would truly get to know these students as people — their uniqueness, their hopes and their experience with loss. It always fascinated me how he emerged from these discussions with the same conclusion: each student was more remarkable than the next, more brilliant, more insightful. One week, he met the next Einstein, another week it was Schweitzer or Osler. He was always hopeful, seeing promise in everyone and enamored by each person's potential — he only recognized and gave credit to goodness. He more than taught, he inspired. In a speech to medical students, Bob memorably said, "When our work is at its finest, together we have seen in those



entrusted to our care the emergence of the best of human nature — the courage, grace, dignity and love of which one is capable. To the extent that we are able to play a part in that wonder, we are ourselves elevated and transformed. It may be that recognition which should be foremost in what we need to teach, for what happens at the bedside is not just a function of what we know, but of what we are.”

How those we love leave us at the end of their lives is an extension of our relationship with them.

It matters; it informs and guides us as we struggle through grief and embrace their remembrance.

Bob’s end of life journey is not just a story to remember, it is one worthy of reverence. Bob left us with the same eloquence, principle and strength that carried him throughout life; he could not be reduced or defined by illness. Dying didn’t alter his core principles or passions. While in the hospital, he was distressed by the care he witnessed. Through his eyes, those in need always deserved care that was more dignified, more humane.

Bob never denied the reality of his impending death.

I believe he looked past the inevitable and chose instead to affirm life by caring for those around him, through countless gestures of love and grace. He showed us hope and love even while he was saying goodbye. True to the richness of his soul, he sought beauty. In the waning minutes of life, he recited Shakespeare. And of course, he found humor, even in the dark and lonely hours. Two nights before he passed, he must have been confused about time and texted me at 3:36 a.m. There were typos, so he kept retyping variations of the same message. After the third attempt, he texted “Maybe we should just go for lunch.”

Bob also remained dutiful till the very end.

He was incapable of being an imposition, which made him a horrible patient. He refused to call me for support during the night. He told his wife Linda that he didn’t want to wake me. His son

Mike remarked that his cause of death could be “failure to impose.” In his last hours, he openly expressed regret at not being able to finish his thank you notes.

As in life, he was compelled to express in words the warmth that was in his heart.

One passage reads, “You will find me when you least expect to, in your words and gestures, your stories recollected and retold, when a sight or sound or smell calls our moments together in memory. Listen for my voice when days are long, decisions are difficult, times hard, knowing that my love and encouragement endure forever; your values and instincts are good — your inner voice sounds a lot like mine.”

On May 9th, Mother’s Day, he wrote his beloved wife Linda that, “My last conscious thought will be of you, and the last word on my lips will be your name.” As promised, when that moment called, he turned his head and gazed into her eyes — leaving us as gracefully as he lived. ■

A Beautiful *Friendship*

My friendship with Bob Milch started the way the movie *Casablanca* ended, as Rick and Louis strolled together into the mist after their courageous defiance of the Nazis: “Louis, I think this is the beginning of a beautiful friendship.” We were introduced by Ira Byock, who, like Bob, was a pioneering and major figure in American hospice care. All of us agreed that the specialty of surgery needed to be included in the then nascent field of palliative care.


When we first met, I was immediately struck by Bob’s contagious generosity of spirit and warm, slightly ironic humor. These qualities, along with his rapier-like intellect, proved to be essential throughout our collaboration, in which we applied the concepts of palliative care to surgical care. His handsome visage, impeccable manners and dress, along with his thoughtful speech, were additional assets that furthered this mission. Overall, he gave an impression of determined compassion. He had risked much professionally, departing from a highly successful surgical practice, to become a full-time advocate for patients with terminal illness. He often referred to us as “recovering surgeons” when we were later asked who we were. Interestingly, we were both sons of highly respected surgeons. I considered myself blessed to be the junior partner, working with one of the most experienced and respected practitioners of hospice care in the country.

For surgeons and non-surgical palliative care practitioners, the involvement of surgeons in hospice and palliative care seemed almost an oxymoron. With typical wit, he reassured non-surgeons in the new specialty, “We were the last to come to the table, but we have the sharpest utensils!” We became so linked in our work that we acquired and subsequently used several monikers such as Lewis and Clark, Banting and Best, and Abbott and Costello.

The foundational meeting for the future specialty of surgical palliative care left us elated. It seemed that everything we cherished in humanities and surgery had come together. We couldn’t wait to get on with the lengthy wish list of projects and goals our fledgling group of like-minded surgeons had agreed upon. We gave each other a hug at the end of that day as I left Buffalo to return home. It clearly was a “beautiful friendship.” The next day, auspiciously enough, was September 11, 2001.

Our fondest shared memory was the high noon moment when we had an audience with Dr. John Cameron. Dr. Cameron was then chief of surgery at Johns Hopkins, arguably the most famous department of surgery in the world. He was a redoubtable figure who was the personification of everything orthodox and sound in the practice of surgery. He had held countless leadership positions, was the editor of one of the most widely read surgical textbooks and had trained countless residents who subsequently became highly positioned academic researchers and chairpersons. We believed that if we could demonstrate to Dr. Cameron the necessity of systematically introducing the precepts and practices of palliative care to the practice of surgery, the culture of surgery would change. As we apprehensively waited for his entrance, Bob loosened the tension, saying, “Nice work, Sweetest. Here we are, two dufuses from Buffalo, in the heart of Hopkins, going to bat against John Cameron! Do you know where the fire exit is in this place?” It went well. Bob’s experience and credibility with respect to symptom control and mentoring of residents was highly persuasive. Dr. Cameron could not have been more gracious and subsequently supportive. I was answering most of the questions, but he was watching Bob.

Only a mensch like Bob could have the compassion, intellect, and vision to seamlessly reconcile two fields as diverse as surgery and hospice/palliative care. Both fields changed forever.

A Salute of *Gratitude*

Lynn Riker, Director of Outreach for Hospice & Palliative Care Buffalo, recently had the opportunity to visit with Frank, a patient in our Home Connections program. Frank shared his sincere gratitude for the home-based support and care coordination offered by Home Connections. His quality of life has improved due to better symptom management, a greater understanding of his disease and routine visits from a team of palliative care experts.

Frank, a Vietnam War Army veteran, had been struggling with debilitating pain, weakness, loss of appetite and recurring infections related to his prostate cancer. In March of 2020, Frank was referred to Home Connections, our home-based palliative care program. Home Connections offers a team of nurse case managers, nurse practitioners, social workers and a palliative-care-trained physician, who all work together to manage symptoms in the home, avoid hospital admissions and help improve communication between patients and their many health care providers.

Although Frank has a great deal of help from family and friends, he lives alone and continues to require assistance in managing his care and symptoms. The one medication thought to be the most effective for him was much too costly, so Frank continued to suffer with uncontrolled pain. With effective collaboration between his Home Connections team and the VA, it was identified that Frank was eligible for veteran benefits, which he had been unaware of prior to our involvement in his care. Fortunately, Frank was able to obtain the medication that was previously too costly, and this resulted in vastly improved pain control.

The Home Connections social worker conducted a Needs Assessment and was able to connect Frank with Meals on Wheels, and knowing Frank wished to avoid unnecessary visits to the emergency room, she secured a life alert to expedite assistance, should a need arise. In addition to regularly scheduled visits, Frank and his family know they can call Home Connections anytime, 24/7, to speak with a nurse. This extra layer of support provides Frank and his family with peace of mind.

Frank is quick to share how much he appreciates the Home Connections program, especially his nurse, Damarys. When Frank first enrolled in Home Connections, he stated that the level of pain associated with his prostate cancer often rated an 8 or 9 out of 10. Since his pain is now better managed, Frank is feeling better, his appetite has improved and he has regained some of his strength, allowing him to be more independent. Frank said, "My nurse Damarys really knows me, not just as a patient, but as an individual. She genuinely cares. She is thorough and professional. Enrolling in Home Connections is one of the best things I have done to better manage my illness, my weakness, and my pain. I am grateful for the care and support, and so is my family."

As mentioned previously, Frank served in the Army during the Vietnam War as a supply specialist, a clerk, and a helicopter gunner. Later, he worked at the Ford Plant. Though a private man, Frank would want you to know that being a father, grandfather and great grandfather means the world to him. His love and unwavering commitment to his faith gives him the strength to care for himself, and to care for others as a minister in his church. The Home Connections team helped improve Frank's pain control and quality of life so he can focus on what means the most to him.

A Life Well Lived, Lessons Well *Learned*

A Priceless, Loving Legacy

That's the ever-popular, classic Sinatra song that was playing in the Hospice Unit room that daughters Paula and Mary Friona vividly recall as their beloved 80-year-old father, Philip Friona, peacefully passed away four years ago. "That was Dad's favorite song," fondly remembered Mary. "How fitting and apropos for him to pass while these lyrics played on. He did live life 'his way,' and he taught his four children and twelve grandchildren the important life lessons in 'his way.'"

Philip, an Air Force veteran, who served in Korea and later grew a local family construction and pavement business, found himself as a single dad, left to raise four young children. The business was started by his father, who Philip loved working with and learning from. Daughter Paula now reminisces about how important family, fun, philanthropy and a strong work ethic were to their dad. Both girls shared memories of their dad piling all the neighborhood kids into their Lincoln Continental to cruise for ice cream and loudly singing "Benny and the Jets." "He was home every night for family tv and board games," recalled Paula. Everyone who knew Phil marveled at his strong patriotism and love for our country.

He taught good old-fashioned life lessons that the four siblings have never forgotten and then passed on to Phil's twelve grandchildren and seven great grandchildren. Mary giggled and explained, "Other kids were learning math and science from their parents, and we were learning how to pick a trifecta and fill out a football pool." She added that he was always big on doing the right thing, loving and being loved. He believed in making memories. "He would call and tell us all, 'C'mon, grab the kids and let's go to the Bahamas,'" shared Mary. "Next thing we knew, tickets would show up! It was just one of the many ways he was so generous!"

Phil's generosity did not end with his family. His giving was an extension of his passions. He loved babies, kids, Veterans, and just helping people in general," said Paula. After his passing, the kids felt strongly in keeping his name and mission

alive, so they started **Totally Buffalo Cares**, a 501(c)3 organization that focuses on bringing hope and help to those in need—particularly around all holidays throughout the year, by offering gifts, food and supplies to those who may need uplifting—all in the spirit of their Dad’s memory and giving way.

Phil unfortunately became ill with dementia and a chronic heart condition. He was living in a Florida nursing home, when son Phil went to visit. He noticed his dad’s deteriorating health had taken a turn for the worse. Philip was rushed to the hospital. The siblings that he had so lovingly taught and raised were now faced with a decision about what to do, suddenly asking themselves what “his way” would be?

They weren’t sure how to respond when asked if they wanted him go into hospice care. They felt devastated, sad and panicked; however, from the second they arrived in hospice care, all four of them immediately felt comfortable with their decision. “They were so sweet and compassionate,” remembered Mary. “They explained medications and what to expect, and I will never forget the nurse telling us to cherish and enjoy this time with him...The four of us, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, and many of Papa’s

grandchildren gathered around his bed for the next three days, reminiscing and laughing about all of the fun memories he created for us over the years, while Dad’s favorite Frank Sinatra hits played on in the room.”

Mary and Paula described how unbelievable it was to feel the power of peace when you know the most important person in your life is at the end of life yet still comfortable. “They came in and swooped away the worry,” said Paula. Mary added, “After his passing, the hospice nurse came in and placed a beautiful purple orchid on his chest. Hospice care gave us the greatest honor in being able to be with him until the end.”

It is for these reasons that the four Friona children feel strongly that their Dad’s memory lives on through **Totally Buffalo Cares**. They have been helping Hospice & Palliative Care Buffalo around the holidays for years because they know the importance of helping others through their emotional, physical and spiritual pain. They have donated funding as well as countless hours of time through volunteerism and committee work. Hospice & Palliative Care Buffalo is so grateful for all they do and for all their dad did to help them learn to love “his way.”

SHANISE HIGHSMITH, LPN



Shanise Highsmith was taught by her parents: Do the right thing, and do it with all your heart. Shanise embraced this philosophy at a very early age, and as she grew older, she knew she had to choose a career path that would allow her to apply those lifelong lessons.

As a result, she became a certified nursing assistant and began her career in a skilled nursing facility. It was there that her personality, compassion and skilled care for the frail elderly was duly noted by the hospice staff, who were assigned to residing patients there.

Shanise was always drawn to the dying patient, whose needs she felt uniquely qualified to meet, not because of her training in class, but because of those lessons instilled, early on, at home. Shanise remained there for almost three years, and eventually made a change to come to Hospice & Palliative Care Buffalo in the Hospice Inpatient Unit. Shanise was thrilled to follow her passion, working with end-of-life patients, in another organization, where she felt her aide skills could be utilized, appreciated and respected as an integral part of the healthcare team.

It took no time for Shanise to acclimate to her new role, becoming one of the Inpatient Unit's

most beloved nursing assistants. The patients and families, along with her colleagues and managers, all recognized the strengths she possessed, undergirded with a sense of integrity and commitment to the mission.

Shanise received daily accolades and stellar annual reviews, and yet she found herself longing for more. She knew she had not fully reached her potential and dared to entertain the thought of becoming a nurse. This longing was not a “one per household” event, however. Her mother also felt the calling to become a nurse, and they enrolled together! Today, both Shanise and her mom are licensed nurses, and they wear their designations with pride.

Despite the change in her role and responsibilities, Shanise made a commitment to her colleagues that she is not willing to forfeit the opportunity to provide personal care to her patients, as she did in her previous role. She remembers the nurses who were never above offering a hand to help when she was an aide and she vowed that if she ever became a nurse, she would do the same. She has kept that promise and considers her role as an LPN (licensed practical nurse), one that combines all her skills — both as an aide and a nurse — all for the benefit of patients and their families.

Shanise is currently in the process of orienting to her new skills as an LPN, and those who are working alongside her say she is tackling her new role with the same ease and enthusiasm as she did when she first came to work for Hospice & Palliative Care Buffalo. Her preceptor, Jenny Wojdyla, has been instrumental in her training, and enjoys seeing the “lightbulb moments” when Shanise successfully completes a task independently.

Denise Pellegrino, Director of the Inpatient Unit fondly notes, “Shanise shines! Behind that beautiful smile is a woman who is compassionate, respectful, eager and driven. She works with her whole heart.” When asked if she feels satisfied with her career path as an LPN, she delivered one of those smiles and said, “I think there’s more!”

A Volunteer Story

To many, Wednesday is a day of the week, like any other. Some consider it the middle of the week, knowing it is that much closer to the weekend. For two of our volunteers, Shirley and Georgiana, Wednesday is the best day of the week!

Shirley and Georgiana are patient support volunteers. They have both been with Hospice & Palliative Care Buffalo (HPCB) since 1995, giving their time to working with our patients and families in the Hospice Inpatient Unit (HIU) on Wednesday mornings. Starting just a couple of months apart from one another, as perfect strangers, Shirley and Georgiana found that their volunteer assignment soon turned into a treasured friendship.

Shirley had a personal experience with hospice that first led her to volunteer at HPCB. Shirley's daughter-in-law, Rosi, had a terminal illness and passed away in hospice care. Shirley said, "In seeing the care that both Rosi and my son received through hospice, I had decided then that I wanted to be a hospice volunteer in my retirement." Shirley retired one month later and joined the HPCB team as a hospice volunteer, the following year.

Georgiana had been a nurse and always had an interest in hospice care. "I have always been more medically inclined and drawn to more medically related volunteer opportunities," Georgiana recalled. In the 1990s, Georgiana had a younger family and was still working part-time. They lived not far from Como Park Blvd. "One day," continued Georgiana, "I was driving home and noticed a sign for the Hospice Mitchell campus. It was like a sign and message for me, so I decided to start volunteering. I was very fortunate that my employer allowed me to have Wednesdays off so I could come and volunteer."

Every Wednesday, week after week, Shirley and Georgiana divided up the patient rooms in the HIU. Shirley took the rooms on the left and Georgiana took the rooms on the right, providing companionship and support to patients and families. Georgiana would often run into patients she once cared for as a nurse while volunteering. "What is nice about being a volunteer is that you have no time constraints like you would when you work a job. You are able to work at your leisure. If you want to spend a little more time with a patient, you can do so," Georgiana said.

Staff would often save tasks for them, knowing that every Wednesday morning, they would be in and ready to help. "It was a labor (using the term very loosely) of love," said Shirley. If either volunteer was ever spotted without the other, they were often met with the question, "Where's your buddy?" To which the response was, "In a patient's room."

Georgiana chuckled while sharing that she was always apprehensive to go into a patient's room that had a pet in it. In those instances, Shirley would step right up, go into the patient room and always come out saying, "You will be able to go in that room, the pet is harmless." Volunteer duties have shifted over the years, and some days were busier than others, but Shirley and Georgiana always came together at the end of their shift to say, "It was another good day."

Reflecting on over 25 years of volunteer work at HPCB, Shirley expressed, "Georgiana is the only volunteer partner I have ever had. I have learned so much from working alongside her." Georgiana said, "Shirley and I were able to work alone, but always supported or reminded each other of anything needing to be followed up with. We blended and worked so well together. It was just meant to be for us."

They both shared their fondness for the staff they have had the opportunity to know and work with over the years, including Dr. Robert Milch. Both recalled how "professional and gentlemanly" he was, sharing that he would always say "hello" and ask how they were doing. Georgiana recalled a time when she was dining at a restaurant: "Dr. Milch was there, and he took the time to come say hello to me and introduce me to his wife."

"When you volunteer at HPCB, you look at it in such a different way. You develop such a compassion for people," commented Georgiana. "It is amazing how many people, friends, neighbors and family members you run into that you know from our community. It is not a sacrifice to volunteer. It is an honor."

Volunteering at HPCB not only connects volunteers and patients. Rather, it connects our community as a whole. Unique bonds are formed at all levels. Volunteering introduced Shirley and Georgiana as strangers but has led them to a wonderful lifelong friendship that they both describe as, "Like family." ■

Did You *Know*?

Did you know that if you hold an IRA (individual retirement account) at the age of 72, you are required to take a minimum distribution — even if you do not want or need the funds? Are you familiar, though, with a qualified charitable distribution? A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) allows individuals who are 70 ½ years old or older to donate up to \$100,000 total to one or more charities directly from a taxable IRA instead of taking their required minimum distributions. As a result, you may avoid being pushed into a higher income tax bracket and prevent phaseouts of other tax deductions, although there are some limitations.
