# Although 2020 offered unique challenges, it also provided the opportunity to modernize and adapt the ways we work.





#### PATIENT IMPACT STORY

I am a hospice patient and I receive services in my home. When asked how hospice helps me, I instantly say that I think of hospice as my "lifeline."


I do not want to go to the hospital, so I need access to 24/7 support when I have questions or concerns. The hospice staff is wonderful, caring and always there to help me when I need it. My nurse, social worker, spiritual care counselor, home health aide and massage therapist all work together to bring me comfort as my disease becomes more challenging.

I have inclusion body myositis (IBM), a rare condition that causes muscle weakness and damage. Symptoms of IBM vary. The rate of disease progression and the intensity of symptoms are different for everyone. In my case, I struggle with debilitating weakness and pain, first in my hands, arms and face, and now

especially in my legs. I also have shortness of breath and challenges swallowing. In addition, dealing with my physical limitations increases my anxiety. Thankfully, I can talk about everything I am thinking and feeling with the hospice team and they ease my burden.

Hospice & Palliative Care Buffalo (HPCB) has been with me throughout my journey. Initially, I was enrolled in Home Connections, HPCB's home-based palliative care program, which helped coordinate my care with my primary care physician and specialists. A nurse and social worker would check in on me to provide an extra layer of support. As my care needs became more involved, hospice care was recommended. I will admit, I was hesitant at first, thinking it was not time for hospice. After many conversations, and due to my increased weakness, I decided to enroll in hospice. I have learned that it is never too soon to ask for help. Hospice is providing access to even more services to assist with my medical needs, as well as my emotional and spiritual needs. I am thankful for the great care that I receive.

# Did you know?

We expanded our reach by utilizing new technology and new ways to engage.

#### Harvest Fest:

- Reinvented as a Dining at Home virtual experience with full program and online auction.
- Happy hour baskets were introduced, attracting a whole new audience with a lower price point.

#### Memorial Walk:

- Organized the first virtual walk in our history while the world was shutting down due to COVID-19.
- Created a new virtual wreath where participants could place their ribbon in honor of their loved one.

- Over 1,300 Light-A-Life bells were sold to our Hospice community!
- The Light-A-Life Memorial Tree Lighting Ceremony was televised for the first time ever, reaching viewers safely at home.







# Hospice Buffalo


Hospice Buffalo cares for seriously ill people with a prognosis of 6 months or less who are not receiving curative treatments. Our patients receive comprehensive care from an interdisciplinary team addressing the medical needs of the individual, as well as the psychosocial, emotional and spiritual needs of both the patient and their family. The hospice team is available to assist on a 24/7 basis whether the individual is residing in a private home, nursing home, assisted living facility or group home. Grief support is included and is offered to loved ones for 13 months after experiencing a loss.

## **Palliative Care**

Palliative care is available to adults and children at any point during their serious illness, even while receiving treatment, so we can improve our patients' quality of life while focusing on symptom, pain and stress management. Care guidance is provided at home or in an assisted living facility with 24/7 nursing access.
